Students who register and withdraw before the first day of classes (August 30) will be refunded their tuition payments in full. Tuition refunds are made according to the following schedule:

RESIDENCE HALL ROOM AND BOARD

All students residing in the college housing facilities will board in the college dining hall. A five-day meal service plan is required of all students; a seven-day meal service plan is available for those desiring it.

If it is necessary for a student to withdraw from college, refunds on meals and room will be made on a pro rata basis as follows:

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

1. Students transferring to Dakota State College must take a minimum of five hours in their major to be recommended for graduation.
2. For courses that are repeated, only the second grade received will be counted in the cumulative grade point average.

CHANGES AND ADDITIONS IN ACADEMIC CURRICULUM

DIVISION OF EDUCATION AND PSYCHOLOGY

New Courses

Ed 425 INTERACTION LABORATORY AND FIELD SEMINAR. The laboratory experience in this course emphasizes the development of human relationship skills important in teaching VIZ, non-verbal communication, trust, role-playing, security giving, feedback, etc. The seminar conducted at the various student teaching stations emphasizes the problems encountered as related to theory and practice in the modern school. 4 hours

DIVISION OF FINE AND APPLIED ARTS

New Courses

Art 314 SCULPTURE. Includes a study of contemporary sculpture, forms, materials, and methods through practical experience of working and studying in the media. 2 hours

Art 403 ADVANCED DRAWING. Advanced study with various drawing media aimed at solving problems of composition and the completion of drawing. Prerequisites: Art 101 and Art 310, or consent of the instructor. 2 hours

DIVISION OF SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS

New Courses

Math 402 DIFFERENTIAL EQUATIONS. This course includes linear differential equations, linear equations, with constant coefficients, solution by series, and first order equations. Prerequisite: Math 216 3 hours

Math 410 FOUNDATIONS OF ANALYSIS. This course covers construction of the real numbers, sequences and point sets, limits and continuity, and differentiability. Strongly recommended for those planning graduate work. Prerequisite: Math 301, Math 306. 3 hours

DIVISION OF SOCIAL SCIENCE AND BUSINESS

New Courses

Bus 322 FUNDAMENTALS OF DATA PROCESSING. A study of the basic principles of processing data by automatic means. Explains automation and acquaints the students with equipment and special languages needed in this field. 3 hours

Bus 440 MANAGEMENT OF PERSONNEL. Introductory analysis of the management of human resources in business organizations. Theory, principles, concepts, and practices of developing and utilizing personnel. 3 hours

Bus 475 BUSINESS INTERNSHIP. The senior student is provided with practical experience in a successful business operation. 2 or 3 hours

Hist 438 EUROPE SINCE 1914. A survey and analysis of European political, military, economic, social and intellectual developments since 1914. Prerequisite: Hist 151. 3 hours
